Conference Dates: Friday, June 21, 2013 to Sunday, June 23, 2013



As in past years, when we have not received funding for our conference, we are doing everything in our power to keep costs to a minimum while giving participants a big bang for their buck. Based on comments in past


years' conference evaluations, we have been very successful in this goal.



# Focus on Training

The Training Development Advisory and Certification Committee (TDAC) met to review the Pilot Site guidelines and task-based activities template for LLO's Trillium Project, "Task-Based Activities for Laubach Way to Reading Series".

TDAC members reviewed the courses that are on Trainingpost, LLO's online classroom on Moodle. There are now 6 OALCF modules online as well as:

- 1. General section (on how to use Moodle)
- 2. Learner section
  - Understanding Government, Fire, Health (from BLEST project)
  - LWR 1 (Laubach Way to Reading practices for low level one learners)
- 3. Practitioner section
  - Tutor Training
  - Trainer Workshop
  - Supervising Trainer Workshop

The Tutor Training section can be personalized for member agencies, and is divided into Laubach Enhanced Training System segments (LETS) + OALCF information:

- \*Section #1: Introduction to Laubach
- \*Section #2: The Adult Student
- \*Section #3: Tutoring Strategies, Techniques and Resources
- \*Section #4: Lesson Planning and Ongoing Student Assessment
- \*Understanding the Ontario Adult Literacy Curriculum Framework (OALCF)

The Trainer Workshop section was developed through an MTCU project—Essential Skills for Literacy Practitioners. Jo Mutch was the first apprentice trainer to be certified by taking her entire trainer workshop online. Based on her feedback, and after some discussion, TDAC is piloting a Blended Trainer Workshop, using the "flipped classroom" model.

ATs will complete the online work first, and meet face-to-face in Cambridge in April to complete assignments and do the "hands on" interactive pieces of the workshop.





# Performance Management Webinars

Community Literacy of Ontario's webinar series covers the following:

<u>WEBINAR #1</u> – Leadership and Performance Management in LBS. This webinar provides an overview of performance management systems. It also highlights the critical role of leaders in an outcomes-based service model and the connection between performance management and service excellence.

<u>WEBINAR #2</u> – LBS PMS: Performance Management – Business Intelligence and Reports. This webinar focuses on two of the three components of the LBS PMS:

**The Performance Measurement Framework:** the service quality standard, core measures and organizational capacity.

**Business Intelligence:** the use of CaMS data and reports to make evidence-based decisions and service improvements.

The Detailed Service Quality Report is reviewed in detail.

<u>WEBINAR #3</u> – LBS PMS: Continuous Improvement – Data Analysis. This webinar focuses on the third component of LBS PMS:

**Continuous Improvement:** the integration of measuring and planning into the fabric of the organization. It shows how data "tells a story" of past performance and provides key information to support future-focused evidence-based decision making from agency, regional, sector and provincial perspectives.

## MEMBER SURVEY RESULTS

Here is a summary of Question #1 on the Survey--

We would like to know your two biggest agency-related concerns. Please list them in order of importance.

The results of the recent 2013 member survey that: Laubach Literacy Ontario sent out to all of its members are posted on our member wiki at:

Your feedback will help inform us as we plan for Conference 2013, and as we develop our two-year strategic plan.



#### **FUNDING**

10 out of 33 respondents listed funding as their biggest concern, and 6 listed it as their second biggest concern. In other words, roughly 50% of respondents are concerned about funding (compared to last year, when the Ontario Adult Literacy Curriculum Framework (OALCF) was THE burning issue, and funding the second burning issue).

Some of the comments around funding were: lack of adequate funding to provide the services contracted, lack of staff and funding to implement all the changes (e.g. OALCF, EOIS-CaMS, Performance Management, Risk Management), new funding model to provide better program management, sustainable funding, where a reliable source of money is coming from (e.g. agencies are often needing to fundraise instead of doing the work their agencies are committed to), not enough funding to support OALCF by hiring more qualified help, lack of funding to pay staff for increased work.



#### LEARNERS/CLIENTS

Almost 40% of respondents mentioned attracting, retaining and/or assessing learners as their first or second concern.

#### Comments:

Proper intake assessment and assessment to show progress, how to get more clients, outreach strategies, attracting learners in a geographically dispersed area, attracting clients, attracting learners, lack of appropriate learners, client numbers declining, student retention and commitment to learning, lower learner numbers, meeting our targeted number of learners for the year, ensuring learners are properly assessed.



#### **EOIS-CaMS & OALCF**

A common theme after funding concerns and learner issues was around EOIS-CaMS, and OALCF implementation. In most instances, it was concern over staff time required to deal with training issues and administering OALCF and EOIS-CaMS.

Comments: Reading and analyzing EOIS-CaMS reports, continuing of training related to EOIS-CaMS, implications of reporting through EOIS-CaMS, administrative time required to deal with EOIS-CaMS/OALCF implementation, EOIS-CaMS and OALCF and Performance Management overload, time constraints due to increase in TCU paperwork, meeting reporting requirements of TCU, training tutors in OALCF.

#### OTHER CONCERNS:

#### **Volunteers & training**

OALCF, getting instructors to move to task-based instruction, lack of appropriate volunteers, attracting and recruiting volunteers, overall tutor training.

#### Staff

Building capacity with volunteers, training tutors in Need to plan for succession if two staff members leave or retire, staffing, professional development, workload, continuing to keep ahead of trends and technology in the field, changing role of the Executive Director.
