


Saskatchewan Adult Literacy Benchmarks

Levels 1 and 2 of the Saskatchewan Literacy Benchmarks are general skills, abilities, and attitudes adults need to function in their world. *The Circle of Learning* is a physical representation of the Benchmarks. Instructional content is related to the specific contexts of learners' lives and is delivered contextually, with the learner identifying what s/he needs to learn.

Circle of Learning

- 1. Draws on the gifts of mind, body, heart, and spirit to create a holistic learning experience;
- 2. Takes a learner-centred approach to lifelong learning;
- 3. Is a way adult learners and practitioners can learn together;
- 4. Honours the knowledge and experiences that learners bring to the learning environment;
- 5. Encourages critical reflection on what has been learned; and
- 6. Respects, affirms, and empowers the learner, his family, community, and practitioners.

General Tips

\$163,000 Trillium grant enables LLO and five agencies to launch 'Social Enterprise' programs

Laubach Literacy Ontario (LLO) recently received a \$163,000 grant from the Ontario Trillium Foundation (OTF) to help six adult literacy agencies setup revenue-generating businesses – or "Social Enterprises" - in their communities.

The program focuses on strengthening the capacity of and building long-lasting sustainability of non-profit adult literacy agencies.

The businesses can generate revenues by offering a variety of programs and services to people of all ages. In addition to offering the potential to create much-needed funding, the projects can offer many side benefits for the agencies' and their students, and for the communities as a whole – these include employment and training opportunities, and community development.

Imagine being able to take on such projects as additional adult skills upgrading, teaching computer skills, developing food service ventures like small cafés or bakeries or storefront businesses. These "storefronts" might include used book, clothing or furniture stores – whatever the research shows is needed and will work in the individual communities, and whatever will best support each agency's mission and goals.

The 18-month grant for the "Social Enterprise" project will establish pilot projects in the Midland Area Reading Council, Hamilton Literacy Council, North Bay Literacy Council, Literacy Alliance of West Nipissing Adult Learning Centre,

The Literacy Group of Waterloo Region-Kitchener, and Barrie Literacy Council.

Each agency will complete the necessary research, planning, organizational development and fund development stages within their organizations before implementing their individual projects.

Lessons learned during the various implementation experiences will result in the creation of tools and templates, and the development of a support mechanism for other LLO member agencies enabling them to establish successful social enterprise ventures within their organizations.

"This initiative is something that our organization is proud to be instrumental in introducing to these communities," said LLO's Executive Director, Lana Faessler. "We see tremendous potential for these agencies and we look forward to working with our newly established Social Enterprise Advisory Committee, which is made up of representatives from the agencies, business and marketing professionals and other literacy groups."
